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### **HOPEFUL HIRING CLIMATE EXPECTED FOR CHARLOTTETOWN**

(Charlottetown, PE, September 9, 2014) – Charlottetown area employers expect a hopeful hiring climate for the fourth quarter of 2014, according to the latest Manpower Employment Outlook Survey.

“Survey data reveals that 13 per cent of employers plan to hire for the upcoming quarter (October to December) while three per cent anticipate cutbacks,” stated Mindy Stoltz of Manpower’s Saint John office. Another 83 per cent of employers plan to maintain their current staffing levels in the upcoming quarter, while one percent of employers is unsure of their hiring intentions.

“With seasonal variations removed from the data, Charlottetown’s fourth quarter Net Employment Outlook of 13 per cent is an increase of five percentage points when compared to the previous quarterly Outlook,” said Stoltz. “It is also an eight percentage point increase from the Outlook reported during the same time last year, indicating a positive hiring pace for the upcoming months.”

“We continue to see some positive signs from employers across the country. However, the hiring climate is expected to be more modest in the fourth quarter, with the weakest Net Employment Outlook we’ve seen since the second quarter of 2010,” said Byrne Luft, Vice President of Operations for Manpower Canada. “Although the political environments in Quebec and Ontario have stabilized after their provincial elections, it has not yet translated to an uptick in the general mood, particularly among SMBs. We do expect to see growth in the public administration, transportation & public utilities, and financial, insurance & real estate sectors however, and energy

exports continue to grow at a strong rate. This growth is expected to be strongest in Western Canada; Alberta is, once again, a strong driver of the Canadian economy.”
